

Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%



Wendy's Wonderful Kids (WWK) Adoption Placement Program Status, December 2014

Dave Thomas Foundation Partnership

ODJFS continues the partnership with the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption (DTFA) which, through its signature Wendy's Wonderful Kids (WWK) program, has increased the number of adoptions of children aged 9 to 17 in the permanent custody of children service agencies. Under the WWK model, children are 1.7 times more likely to be adopted than those not served. Many of these children have been in foster care for more than two years.



Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%







Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%











Ohio's Collection Rate on Current Support Due Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%

















Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%











Ohio's Collection Rate on Current Support Due Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%





















































































































Ohio's Collection Rate on Current Support Due Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%







Ohio's Collection Rate on Current Support Due Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%





Ohio's Collection Rate on Current Support Due Federal Performance Standard $\geq 80\%$





















Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%







































Ohio's Collection Rate on Current Support Due Federal Performance Standard \geq 80%









































































































































Federal Performance Standard $\geq 80\%$




















