

# **Child Day Care**

**Child Day Care Statistical Report--January 1, 2005 through June 30, 2005**

This report is prepared by the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS), Bureau of Child Care, in compliance with HB 117. The report is itemized by child's age, family income, provider type and child care program payment source. The source of all data is the ODJFS 3299 Child Care On-Line Reporting System.

The format of the report and the type of information has not changed from the original report. The report summarizes the number of children receiving publicly funded child day care services, the total cost to the state, the total family fee, and the total cost of child care for the six-month period of January 1, 2005 through June 30, 2005. Total cost to the state includes both federal and state dollars.

Ohio has eight different types of providers. For the purpose of definition, a "Type A" home is a home provider who can care for more than six children, has an assistant, and is licensed by the state. A "Type B" provider is a home provider who can care for up to six children, has no assistant, and is certified by the county. A "Type C" provider is a center, "Type D" is a Day Camp provider, "ELI Contract Agency" is Early Learning Initiative provider, "Type H" is a Head Start provider, and "Type I" is an In-Home Aid provider. "Type L" provider is defined as a limited provider, which is a relative care giver and is certified by the county. "Type S" provider is school-affiliated.

The "Child Care Income Level" report lists the most recent income level that is found in the system for the "payment approval month." If a family changes eligibility during the period, payments could be included for more than one "service month," which could include payments from more than one payment source and more than one income level.
