400	WIA/WIOA (Workforce Investment and Opportunity Act)	Activities and services that increase the employment, retention and earnings of participants, increase occupational skill attainment by participants, and reduce welfare dependency.
401	WIA National Emergency Grants (NEG)/WIOA National Dislocated Worker Grants (NDWG)	Under the Workforce Investment Act (WIA), NEG/NDWG provides emergency employment and training assistance to workers affected by major economic dislocations, such as plant closures, mass layoffs, or closures and realignments of military installations; or to provide assistance for an area that has suffered an emergency or a major disaster; or to provide additional assistance to eligible dislocated workers.

- 118 CCMEP TANF Administration Includes activities and trainings/meetings related to general administration and coordination of CCMEP; appeal hearings for CCMEP related activities; financial recordkeeping changes to file related to eligibility determinations for CCMEP participants not receiving OWF; CCMEP contract creation and administration; preparation of CCMEP plans, budgets and schedules as defined in 5101:14-1-03 ; monitoring of CCMEP plans and projects; monitoring of financial grants and agreements, procurement activities; public relations and outreach; services related to accounting, litigation, audits, management of property, payroll and personnel; management information systems not related to the tracking and monitoring of TANF requirements; and preparing financial reports and other administrative documents. ***DOES NOT INCLUDE determining eligibility for TANF/PRC or any other administrative activity for the TANF/PRC program (use 100). - 119 CCMEP TANF Assessment, Referral, and Individual Service Strategy **(Individual Opportunity Plan)** Includes CCMEP activities and trainings/meetings related to assessing the clients' occupational skills, prior work experience, employability, interests, aptitudes, supportive service needs and developmental needs, development of individual opportunity plan, and development of short term goals for CCMEP. Also includes providing CCMEP program information to clients/participants. ***DOES NOT INCLUDE administrative activities for CCMEP such as general administration or contract administration (use 118) or activities for CCMEP WIOA only participants (use the appropriate 400 code).***

- 120 CCMEP TANF Case Management Activities related to providing CCMEP direct services to eligible individuals and families. Includes activities and trainings/meetings related to curriculum training, intensive case management, barrier removal; issuance of support services including housing (rent, mortgage, property tax, and homeless fee), utilities (services including electric, gas, water, and phone); transportation for CCMEP participants (services including car repairs, allowances, bus tokens, car payments, auto insurance reimbursement, and van services); and education not related to employment (services including instruction or training in literacy education, English as a second language (ESOL) and General Educational Development (GED), component services or activities may include screening; assessment and testing; individual or group instruction; tutoring; provision of book supplies and instructional materials; counseling, transportation; and referral to community resources). - 130 Ohio Youth Works Beginning May 1, 2017 Activities related to Ohio Youth Works program for youth ages 14 and 15 which includes case management and administering payments to employers or third parties to help cover the cost of employee wages and benefits. **Does not include administrative activities such as eligibility determination or contract administration (use 100).**
- 210 Eligibility Activities within the Ohio Benefits (OB) and Ancillary Systems Activities of workers directly related to the eligibility determination process utilizing the Integrated Eligibility System (EIS)/Ohio Benefits and the related ancillary systems. Allowable activities include the following:
Eligibility Determination/Ohio Benefits – Activities related to the completion of manual and automated edits and verification of data for OB (acceptance) while working within the eligibility system(s). Also includes activities related to assisting the automated eligibility determination system in the evaluation of the edited, verified data to make an eligibility determination while working within the eligibility system(s).
On-going Case Maintenance/Ohio Benefits – While working within the eligibility system activities including receipt of data

related to the ongoing eligibility and maintenance of a beneficiary's eligibility, such as annual renewals, address changes, income changes, household composition changes, etc. and any related intake, verification, eligibility determination information and changes, and issuances of eligibility notices. Does not include mailing of such notices.

Notification/Ohio Benefits- Issuance of the eligibility notice to the beneficiary, file updates and while working in the system, all activities related to notification to partners of the decision.

Intake/Ohio Benefits – Activities related to the receipt of the application or data related applications while working within the eligibility system(s) including and scanning such documentation into the eligibility system(s)

Customer Service/Call Center Ohio Benefits Activities - Call center activities related to the receipt of data required for an initial eligibility determination in OB and the on-going eligibility and maintenance of a beneficiary's eligibility (but not verification activities).

Systems Training/Ohio Benefits - Training of personnel directly engaged in the operation of Ohio Benefits, including workers processing claims or determining eligibility

420	Connecting the Dots	Activities to assist emancipating youth who are transitioning out of foster care.
424	CCMEP WIOA Youth Ages 16-24 Out of School Services	Activities other than work experience related to services for CCMEP WIOA Out-of-School Youth. Participants must be ages 16-24, not attending any school, and must have one of the specified barriers such as being low income combined with either basic skills deficient, English language learner, or needing additional assistance; school dropout; subject to the justice system; homeless; runaway; or other barrier listed in WIOA 129(a)(1)(B).
425	CCMEP WIOA Youth Ages 16-24 Out of School Work Experience	For youth participants enrolled in CCMEP WIOA Youth Out-of-School services, costs related to the development and management of work experiences such as job development with employers, preparation of work/training plans, worksite monitoring, and job coaching. Work experiences may be paid or unpaid including summer employment, employment opportunities throughout the year, pre-apprenticeship programs, internships, job shadowing, and on-the-job training.
426	CCMEP WIOA Youth Ages 16-24 In School Services	Activities other than work experience related to services for youth ages 16-21 who are attending school, low income, and have one of several barriers such as basic skills deficient; English language learner; offender; homeless; runaway; or other barrier listed in WIOA section 129(a)(1)(C).
427	CCMEP WIOA Youth Ages 16-24 In School Work Experience	For youth participants enrolled in CCMEP WIOA Youth In-School services, costs related to the development and management of work experiences such as job development with employers, preparation of work/training plans, worksite monitoring, and job coaching. Work experiences may be paid

or unpaid including summer employment, employment opportunities throughout the year, pre-apprenticeship programs, internships, job shadowing, and on-the-job training.

428	CCMEP WIOA Youth Admin	Activities related to the administration of the CCMEP Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) program <i>not related to the direct provision of CCMEP WIOA Youth services.</i>
429	Wage Pathway Model	Activities related to implementing the Wage Pathway Model (WPM) for active CCMEP participants that focuses on entry and progression in the workforce rather than on educational attainment. Also includes activities related to the issuance of WPM incentive payments.
430	ODEP Disability RETAIN	Activities funded by the ODEP Disability RETAIN grant and related to the delivery of services to individuals who experience work disability while employed. Work disability is defined as an injury, illness, or medical condition that has the potential to inhibit or prevent continued employment or labor force participation.
486	Flooding NDWG	Activities funded by the National Dislocated Worker Grant (NDWG) and related to the delivery of services to areas affected by flooding.
487	Lordstown GM NDWG	Activities funded by the National Dislocated Worker Grant (NDWG) and related to the delivery of services to workers affected by the Lordstown GM plant closing.
488	Opioid NDWG	Activities funded by the National Dislocated Worker Grant (NDWG) and related to the delivery of services to individuals affected by the Opioid crisis.
489	RESEA NDWG	Activities funded by the National Dislocated Worker Grant (NDWG) and related to the delivery of services to unemployment insurance claimants.
494	NEG-OH 28 Sector Partnership	Activities of local area staff when working with employers to develop career pathways in high demand industries for the purpose of moving job seekers to employment. For local areas with only a planning grant, allowable activities are regional planning, industry-focused strategies, and establishing sector partnerships as described in TEGL 31-14. For local areas with approved full implementation sector partnership projects activities include those mentioned above as well as other grant related activities as described in TEGL 31-14.
495	NDWG -29 Power Initiative	Activities funded by the National Dislocated Worker Grant (NDWG) and related to the delivery of services to workers affected by changes in the coal industry.
497	WIOA Flood Program #2	Activities funded by the National Dislocated Worker Grant (NDWG) and related to the delivery of services to areas affected by flooding.

- 498 WIOA Opioid Program #3 Activities funded by the National Dislocated Worker Grant (NDWG) and related to the delivery of services to individuals affected by the Opioid crisis.
- 500 Child Care Eligibility Determination **Child care eligibility determination; Child Care Development Fund (CCDF); non-direct services TANF: Administration.** Processing applications, securing required verifications and documentation, establishing and maintaining case records, assisting caretaker with child care provider selection and ensuring caretaker choice from all available eligible providers, authorizing days and hours of service, issuing proper notices to caretaker and provider, entering eligibility and authorization information into the Child Care Licensing Inspections Database System (CCIDS) 3299 reporting system, conducting twelve month eligibility re-determinations, investigating and processing child care improper payments, participating in county conferences and state hearings.
- 501 Child Care Provider Recruitment, Certification and Supervision **Child Care Development Fund (CCDF); non-direct services TANF:** regular provider recruitment, certification, and supervision. Recruitment, certification, and supervision of persons/parties who are, or want to be, service providers to the county's publicly funded child care program. Activities include: outreach to recruit new providers, retention of existing providers, inspection of providers to ascertain both initial and ongoing compliance with certification requirements, technical assistance and training to providers concerning certification requirements, preparation for, and/or participation in, any enforcement proceeding or hearings concerning the certification of a provider, and attending training, or conducting training, on state and/or local provider certification requirements.
- 503 Child Care Administration **Child care administration; Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plan; Admin TANF: Admin.** Maintenance and operation of the subsidized child care program. Activities include: authorization of child care voucher, authorization of payment of the child care benefit, maintenance of applicant/recipient case records and/or provider files, determination of any benefit overpayment or fraud, preparation of any management report, and attending non-child care related training, or conducting non-child care related training, on the general operation of the subsidized child care program.
- 504 Child Care Information **Child care information; Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plan; non-direct services or systems; TANF: regular.** Activities include design and/or maintenance of a county child care web site, design and/or maintenance of county brochures concerning the subsidized child care program responding to third-party inquiries concerning the subsidized child care program, and conducting informational presentations on the nature and operation of the subsidized child care program.
- 505 Title XX Child Care Child care activities provided to Title XX recipients.

506	Protective Child Care	Provide child care for a caretaker for whom a protective case plan is prepared and maintained for the caretaker and children under 13 years old.
507	Special Needs Child Care	Provide child care for a caretaker who is employed or in school/training and has a child up to 18 years of age who meets the definition of special needs.
508	Homeless Child Care	Provide child care for a caretaker and children under 13 years old who either temporarily reside in a facility providing emergency shelter for homeless families, or are determined by the CDJFS to be homeless.
600	Refugee Cash and Medical Assistance	This activity would fall under the Cash and Medical Assistance Grant, including activities related to the general administration, eligibility related activities and coordination of the federally funded Refugee Cash Assistance (RCA) and Refugee Medical Assistance (RMA) Programs. Does not include health services; child care and transportation services not related to employment; interpreter and translation services not related to employment or employability- related services; refugee social services employment and employability-related services that paid for with RSSP funding.

Component services and activities which may include diagnosis and psychological evaluations; alcohol and drug detoxification services; individual, family, and group therapy and counseling; remedial education and GED preparation; vocational or pre-vocational training; training in activities of daily living; supervised recreational and social activities; case management.

- 703 Title XX Foster Care Services For Children Services or activities associated with the provision of an alternative family life experience for abused, neglected or dependent children, between birth and the age of majority, based on a court commitment or voluntary placement agreement signed by the parent or guardian. Services that may be provided to children in foster family homes, foster homes of relatives, group homes, emergency shelters, residential facilities, child care institutions, pre-adoptive homes, or supervised independent living situation. Component services or activities which may include assessment of the child's needs; case planning and case management to assure that the child receives proper care in the placement; medical care as an integral but subordinate part of the service; counseling of the child, the child's parents, and the foster parents; referral and assistance in obtaining other necessary supportive services; periodical reviews to determine the continued appropriateness and need for placement; and recruitment and licensing of foster homes and child care institutions.
- 708 Title XX Recreation Services Services or activities designed to provide or assist adults to take advantage of individual or group activities directed towards promoting physical, cultural, and/or social development.
- 710 Title XX Adoption Services or activities provided to assist in bringing about the adoption of a child. Component services and activities which may include, but are not limited to counseling the biological parent(s), recruitment of adoptive homes, and pre-and-post placement training and/or counseling.
- 713 Title XX Protective Services For Children Services or activities designed to prevent or remedy abuse, neglect, or exploitation of children who may be harmed through physical or mental injury, sexual abuse or exploitation, and negligent treatment or maltreatment, including failure to be provided with adequate foods, clothing, shelter, or medical care. Component services or activities that may include investigation; immediate intervention; emergency medical service; emergency shelter; developing case plans; initiation of legal action (if needed); counseling for the individual and family; assessment/evaluation of family circumstances; arranging alternative or improved living arrangements; preparing for foster placement, if needed; and case management and referral to service providers.
- 715 Title XX Day Treatment For Children This service is designed for providing treatment for a portion of the day for children who manifest primarily emotional, psychological, behavioral, or social problems which cannot be resolved in a non-specialized educational or developmental

setting, or in specialized settings such as learning or behavioral disabilities classes. While these children may be able to live at home or in substitute care, their needs are such that their daily activities must be a part of a treatment environment.

The treatment of children involves specialized clinical services required for diagnosis, treatment, and consultation in providing help for pathological conditions, personality services, as distinguished from other parts of the programs, are provided by staff with professional or technical training for helping the child and parents (or caretakers with whom the child is living) directly through such activities as individual and family prescription drugs, and art and music therapy.

Service components include training activities, special educational activities, social and recreational activities, health services, personal and social interaction skill development, activity therapies, community participation activities, and transportation. These services are integral but subordinate to treatment, which is the purpose of the child's receiving the services. These services are to be offered as an integral program; however, the various components may be delivered through different sources.

The daily activities, including individual and group program components and treatment services prescribed for the individual child, must be coordinated and integrated into an individual goal-directed treatment plan for the child. The plan must delineate a predictable measurable impact on the child's problem assessment of the progress of the plan (i.e., a formal staffing including all necessary parties to review goal attainment and to arrive at a decision of:

- a) continuing the plan;
- b) revising the plan; or
- c) terminating the placement) which must be completed every six months for the total period of treatment.

Federal financial participation is not available for:

- a) Educational services which residents of Ohio usually receive free from a public agency. If provided, services must be integrated, but subordinate to, the provision of this section.
- b) Any activities related to the provision of Ohio Works First (OWF).

Title XX
Counseling Services

Services or activities that apply therapeutic processes to personal, family, situational, or occupational problems to bring about a positive resolution of the problem or improved individual or family functioning or circumstances.

- 719 Title XX Foster Care Services For Adults Services or activities that assess the need and arrange for the substitute care and alternate living situation of adults in a setting suitable to the individual's needs. Individuals may need such services because of social, physical or mental disabilities, or because of abuse or neglect. Care that may be provided in a community-based setting or such services may arrange for institutionalization when necessary. Component services or activities that include assessment of the individual's needs; case planning and case management to assure that the individual receives proper care in the placement; counseling to help with personal problems and adjusting to new situations; assistance in obtaining other necessary supportive services; determining, through periodic reviews, the continued appropriateness of and need for placement; and recruitment and licensing of foster care homes and facilities.
- 720 Title XX Home Delivered Meals Services or activities designed to prepare and deliver one or more meals a day to an individual's residence to prevent institutionalization, malnutrition, and feeling of isolation. Component services or activities that may include the cost of personnel, equipment, and food; assessment of nutritional dietary needs; nutritional education and counseling; socialization services; and information and referral.
- 721 Title XX Home Based Services In-home services or activities provided to individuals or families to assist with household or personal care activities that improve or maintain adequate family wellbeing. Services that may be provided for reason of illness, incapacity, frailty, absence of a caretaker relative, or to prevent abuse and neglect of a child or adult. Major service components that include homemaker service, chore service, home maintenance services, and household management services. Component services or activities that may include protective supervision of adults and/or children to help prevent abuse, temporary non-medical personal care, house-cleaning, essential shopping, simple household repairs, yard maintenance, teaching of homemaking skills, training in self-help and self-care skills, assistance with meal planning and preparation, sanitation, budgeting, and general household management.
- 722 Title XX Services For Communicatively Impaired Services or activities to maximize the potential of persons with disabilities help alleviate the effects of physical, mental or emotional disabilities, and to enable those persons to live in the least restrictive environment possible.
- 723 Title XX Protective Services For Adults Services or activities designed to prevent or remedy abuse, neglect, or exploitation of adults who are unable to protect their own interests. Situations that may require protective services including injury due to maltreatment or family violence; lack of adequate food, clothing or shelter; lack of essential medical treatment or rehabilitation services; and lack of necessary financial or other resource. Component services or activities that may include investigation; immediate intervention; emergency medical service; emergency shelter; developing case plans; initiation of legal action (if needed); counseling for

the individual and family; assessment/evaluation of family circumstances; arranging alternative or improved living arrangements; preparing for foster placement, if needed; and case management and referral to service providers.

- 726 Title XX Employment Services Services or activities provided to assist individuals in securing employment or acquiring or learning skills that promote opportunities.
- 728 Title XX Congregate Meals Services or activities that prepare and serve one or more meals to individuals in central dining areas to prevent institutionalization, malnutrition, and isolation. Component services or activities which may include the cost of personnel, equipment, and food; assessment of nutritional and dietary needs; nutritional education and counseling; socialization; and other services such as transportation and information and referral.
- 729 Title XX Health Related Services In or out of home services or activities designed to assist individuals and families to attain and maintain a favorable condition of health. Component services and activities which may include providing an analysis or assessment of an individual's health problems and the development of a treatment plan; assisting individuals to identify and understand their health needs; assisting individuals to locate, provide, or secure, and utilize appropriate medical treatment, preventative medical care and health maintenance services, including in-home health services and emergency medical services and providing follow-up services as needed.
- 730 Title XX Family Planning Educations, comprehensive, medical, or social services or activities which enable individuals, including minors, to determine freely the number and spacing of their children and to select how this may be achieved. Services and activities which include a broad range of acceptable and effective methods and services to limit or enhance fertility, including contraceptive methods (including natural family planning and abstinence), and the management of infertility (including referral to adoption). Specific component services and activities which may include pre-conceptual counseling, education, and general reproductive health care, including diagnosis and treatment of infections which threaten reproductive capability. Family planning service does not include pregnancy care (including obstetric or prenatal care). These definitions contain medical components which are allowable under Title XX only when they are not available to the individual under Title XVIII, Title XIX and individual or group health insurance plan, or an individual or group health care maintenance program.
- 733 Title XX Case Management Services or activities for the arrangement, coordination and monitoring of services to meet the needs of individuals and families. Component services and activities which may include individual service plan development, counseling, monitoring, developing, procuring, and coordinating services; monitoring

and evaluating client progress; and assuring that clients' rights are protected.

- 734 Title XX Legal Services Services or activities provided by a lawyer or person(s) under a lawyer's supervision to assist individuals in obtaining legal help in civil matters e.g. housing, divorce, child support, paternity, guardianship, and legal separation.
- 735 Title XX Transportation Services or activities that provide or arrange for travel including travel costs of individuals to access services or obtain medical care or employment.
- 736 Title XX Special Services for Alcohol and Drug Abuse Services or activities that are primarily designed to deter, reduce, or eliminate substance abuse or chemical dependency. Except for initial detoxification services, medical and residential services may be included but only as an integral but subordinate part of the service. Component substance abuse services or activities that may include a comprehensive range of personal and family counseling methods, methadone treatment for opiate abusers, or detoxification treatment for alcohol abusers. Services that may be provided in alternative living arrangements such as institutional settings and community-based halfway houses.
- 754 Title XX Education and Training Services Services provided to improve knowledge of daily living skills and to enhance cultural opportunities. Services may include instruction or training in, but are not limited to, such issues as consumer education, health education, community protection and safety education, literacy education, English as a second language and General Educational Development (GED). Component services or activities may include screening; assessment and testing; individual or group instruction; tutoring; provision of book, supplies and instructional materials; counseling, transportation, and referral to community resources.
- 755 Title XX Housing Services Services or activities that assist individuals or families in locating, obtaining, or retaining suitable housing. Component services or activities that may include tenant counseling; helping individuals and families to identify and correct substandard housing conditions on behalf of individuals and families who are unable to protect their own interest; and assisting individuals and families to understand leases, secure utilities, make moving arrangements and renovations.
- 756 Title XX Independent and Transitional Living Services Services or activities designed to help older youth in foster care or homeless youth transition to independent living, or to help adults transition from institution or homelessness to independent living.
- 757 Title XX Pregnancy and Parenting Services Services or activities for married or unmarried adolescent parents and their families designed to assist young parents in coping with the social, emotional, and economic problems

related to pregnancy and in planning for the future. Component services or activities may include securing necessary health care and living arrangements; obtaining legal services; and providing counseling, child care education, and training in and development of parenting skills.

- 758 Title XX Prevention and Intervention Services Services or activities that provide early identification and/or timely intervention to support families and prevent or ameliorate the consequences of abuse, neglect, or family violence, or to assist in making arrangements for alternate placements or living arrangements where necessary. Such services may also be provided to prevent the removal of a child or adult from the home. Component services and activities may include investigation; assessment and/or evaluation of the extent of the problem; counseling, including mental health counseling or therapy as needed; developmental and parenting skills training; respite care; and other services including supervision, case management and transportation.
- 759 Title XX Special Services for Youth Criminals Services or activities for youth who are, or who may become, involved with the juvenile justice system and their families. Component services or activities are designed to enhance family functioning and/or modify the youth's behavior with the goals of developing socially appropriate behavior and may include counseling, intervention therapy and residential and medical services if included as integral but subordinate part of the service.
- 760 PRC Child Welfare Eligibility Activities related to the determination of the eligibility of the child or the child's caretakers for Prevention, Retention, and Contingency (PRC) services; includes case file review, verification of documentation, approval or denial of application and preparation of notice of decision in the office; field, by mail or telephone.
- 761 Child Welfare Intake and Investigation Activities related to the receipt and investigation of complaints alleging the neglect or maltreatment of a child: receipt of the complaint; activities directly related to reaching an agency disposition of the complaint such as scheduling and conducting investigatory interviews, preparing investigatory reports, participation in internal meetings; and general maintenance of the investigatory record.
- 762 PRC Child Welfare Family Preservation Activities Includes activities performed on behalf of a child and their family if all the following apply: there is not an in-home case or a custody case established, the child and family's income meets the income eligibility criteria for the county's PRC plan, and the county has included these services in its PRC plan. Activities include: screening and assessment of needed services, providing program information and referral and linking to services such as family preservation services, domestic violence services, parenting training, substance abuse treatment, and counseling.

Component substance abuse services or activities that may include a comprehensive range of personal and family counseling methods, methadone treatment for opiate abusers, or detoxification treatment for alcohol abusers. Services that may be provided in alternative living arrangements such as institutional settings and community-based halfway houses.
870	Title XX TANF Education and Training Services	Services provided to improve knowledge of daily living skills and to enhance cultural opportunities. Services may include instruction or training in, but are not limited to, such issues as consumer education, health education, community protection and safety education, literacy education, English as a second language and

General Educational Development (GED). Component services or activities may include screening; assessment and testing; individual or group instruction; tutoring; provision of book, supplies and instructional materials; counseling, transportation; and referral to community resources.

- 871 Title XX TANF Pregnancy and Parenting Services Services or activities for married or unmarried adolescent parents and their families designed to assist young parents in coping with the social, emotional, and economic problems related to pregnancy and in planning for the future. Component services or activities may include securing necessary health care and living arrangements; obtaining legal services; and providing counseling, child care education, and training in and development of parenting skills.
- 872 Title XX TANF Prevention and Intervention Services Services or activities that provide early identification and/or timely intervention to support families and prevent or ameliorate the consequences of abuse, neglect, or family violence, or to assist in making arrangements for alternate placements or living arrangements where necessary. Such services may also be provided to prevent the removal of a child or adult from the home. Component services and activities may include investigation; assessment and/or evaluation of the extent of the problem; counseling, including mental health counseling or therapy as needed; developmental and parenting skills training; respite care; and other services including supervision, case management and transportation.
- 873 Title XX TANF Special Services For Youth Criminals Services or activities for youth who are, or who may become involved with the juvenile justice system and their families. Component services or activities are designed to enhance family functioning and/or modify the youth's behavior with the goals of developing socially appropriate behavior and may include counseling, intervention therapy and residential and medical services if included as integral but subordinate part of the service.
- 874 Title XX TANF Family Planning Education, comprehensive medical, or social services activities which enable individuals, including minors, to determine freely the number and spacing of their children and to select how this may be achieved. Services and activities which include a broad range of acceptable and effective methods and services to limit or enhance fertility, including contraceptive methods (including natural family planning and abstinence), and the management of infertility (including referral to adoption).
- 875 Title XX TANF Adult Protective Services Services or activities designed to prevent or remedy abuse, neglect, or exploitation of adults who are unable to protect their own interests. Situations that may require protective services including injury due to maltreatment or family violence; lack of adequate food, clothing or shelter; lack of essential medical treatment or rehabilitation services; and lack of necessary financial or other resource. Component services or activities that may include investigation; immediate intervention; emergency medical service; emergency shelter; developing case plans; initiation of legal action (if needed); counseling for the individual and family;

assessment/evaluation of family circumstances; arranging alternative or improved living arrangements; preparing for foster placement, if needed; and case management and referral to service providers.

- 900 Disability Financial Assistance (DFA) Eligibility Activities Activities related to general administration and coordination of the state funded disability program, including eligibility determinations; screening interviews; intake; review of household reports; eligibility review; benefit changes; appeal hearings; recordkeeping changes to file; overpayment preparation; IEVS activity; contract creation and administration; preparation of program plans, budgets and schedules; procurement activities; public relations; services related to accounting, litigation, audits, management of property, payroll and personnel; management information systems not related to the tracking and monitoring of disability medical assistance (DMA) requirements; preparing reports and other documents; Quality Control; Quality Assurance; Peer Reviews; and Supervisory Reviews.
- 997 Common to Several Activity associated with more than one program, including activities that benefit multiple programs and general administrative activities that cannot be associated with a single program represented on this time study.
- 998 Non-reimbursable Activities that are not being reimbursed or are being reimbursed through a mechanism other than a specific program allocation, such as a special project allocation, contract, or memorandum of understanding with another family services agency or workforce development agency.
- 999 Position Idle Employee was on break, at lunch, on leave or on personal business. Also, a position currently in the time study is idle when it is due to a short-term absence when the observation moment occurs and the position is not reassigned to an employee who is not currently in the time study.
